

# Notes of the Scrutiny and Overview Committee Crime and Disorder Working Group 20<sup>th</sup> October 2014

### 1. <u>TO APPROVE AS CORRECT THE RECORD OF THE MEETING HELD</u> <u>ON 7<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2014</u>

The notes of the meeting held on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2014 were approved as a correct record.

### 2. TO RECEIVE ANY DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest.

#### 3. ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN OR CHIEF EXECUTIVE

There were no announcements.

#### 4. <u>PROTOCOL FOR THE SCRUTINY OF CRIME AND DISORDER</u> <u>MATTERS</u>

The Working Group noted the protocol which outlined the key provisions of the relevant legislation, the terms of reference of the Working Group, the duty to meet at least once a year, the role of scrutinising the CSP Plan and performance reports, the ability to give notice to responsible authorities to require their representatives to attend Working Group meetings or to provide information required for scrutiny.

#### 5. <u>REVIEW OF THE PERFORMANCE IN RELATION TO THE ACTION</u> <u>PLANS 2013/14 FOR THE COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP</u> <u>PLAN</u>

The Working Group reviewed the updates on the CSP Action Plans for 2013/14 which indicated progress or otherwise using red, amber and green coding.

The Working Group noted that the action plans for tackling burglary and for the reduction of the level of risk to repeat and vulnerable victims did not

continue with formal CSP action plans in 2014/15. The other action plans were continuing in 2014/15 along with an additional action plan to tackle issues in relation to drugs and alcohol.

#### Reducing Anti-Social Behaviour Action Plan (lead partners: Horsham District Council and Sussex Police)

The action plan update for 2013/14 for reducing anti-social behaviour showed some actions coded as red to indicate that they had not yet been achieved and delivered.

The Working Group continued to be concerned that ASB data, collected by Sussex Police and previously analysed by the WSCC Insights team, was no longer available because of an internal restructure at WSCC. The Insights team would process special requests for data analysis; the ASB team had not requested that in 2013/14. This action, for the collection and analysis of relevant information, was included again in the ASB action plan for 2014/15.

The Working Group, at its meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2014, had been informed by the Community Safety Manager of this reduction in the level of analytical support that the County Council had once provided and how the Insights Team no longer provided in-depth analysis but would, if requested, provide broad statistics on specified topics. Members suggested that a representative from the County Council be invited to attend the next Working Group meeting to discuss this issue.

Another action coded as red related to the training on ASB for CSP frontline staff, focussing on signs, symptoms, how to report ASB and the available support services. This action was included again in the ASB action plan for 2014/15. Members agreed to request that the Community Safety Manager be invited to attend the next Working Group meeting to discuss this issue.

A further action was coded red in relation to ensuring frontline CSP staff members were trained in the use of the new tools and powers to tackle ASB, and to brief partner agencies on those changes and the way in which ASB was being tackled in Horsham District. The action plan update stated that this task had not been delivered because the new tools were unadopted given that the statutory process was ongoing. The Working Group had been informed at its last meeting that the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2104 had come into effect on 13<sup>th</sup> May 2014. Members agreed to request that the Community Safety Manager be asked to confirm whether this training would be provided. The Working Group noted that ASB crime was currently the largest category of recorded crime in Horsham District. The Chairman referred to the Police and Crime Commissioner's Performance Report for April 2014 which detailed performance in tackling crime in 2013/14; ASB incidents for all of Sussex had shown a reduction of 7.8% in 2013/14. Members noted, however, that ASB recorded crime in Horsham District, had shown significant increases in recent months.

#### Reducing Burglary Action Plan (lead partner: Sussex Police)

The Working Group noted that the total number of burglaries recorded in Horsham District had decreased from 621 incidents in 2012/13 to 571 incidents in 2013/14.

The action plan focussed on reducing the number of domestic burglaries. There had been 261 dwelling burglaries in 2013/14, an increase of five offences when compared with 2012/13.

The Chairman referred to the Police and Crime Commissioner's Performance Report (April 2014) which mentioned crime figures for Sussex in 2013/14; there had been 600 fewer homes burgled in Sussex compared to the previous year; of that number, West Sussex had recorded 200 fewer.

None of the actions for 2013/14 were coded as red.

#### <u>Community engagement and reassurance (lead partners: Horsham District</u> <u>Council and Sussex Police)</u>

The action plan update showed that the promotion of reassurance in the growing night time economy of Horsham town centre by adopting the Purple Flag Award Scheme had not been delivered in 2013/14. This action was included again in the ASB action plan for 2014/15. It was noted that Horsham Unlimited had included a Purple Flag application as part of its plans to form a Business Improvement District.

Another action was also coded as red: the action to hold at least one 'face the people' session in the District in 2013.

This action plan sought to promote the work of the CSP within Horsham District and to engage with communities. It included a task to review the CSP website to ensure it was up-to-date and reflected the CSP priorities for the year. The Working Party was informed that the Horsham District CSP website listed out of date information, campaigns and news items, had not yet posted the CSP Plan for 2014/15, that a number of links to enable the public to report information and alleged crimes did not work, and that the contact email address for the Community Safety team was incorrect. Members felt that this action should be coded red rather than amber and recommended that the CSP be asked to consider closing down its website until the required amendments were achieved.

#### Reducing the level of risk to repeat and vulnerable victims (lead partner: West Sussex County Council)

The action plan update stated that there were low levels of reporting of disability victimisation and hate incidents. That seemed to be at odds with the information in the Police and Crime Commissioner's Performance Report (April 2014) which mentioned crime trends in Sussex for 2013/14; there had been an increase of 33.2% in the reporting of alleged hate crimes; a large increase of 53.8% (170 offences) had been reported in West Sussex.

The Working Group commented on a number of actions which were coded as red; they had not been undertaken because of a lack of resources. The actions related to the support of vulnerable groups and tackling agerelated hate crime.

The Working Group expressed its concern that this action plan no longer featured as a formal CSP action plan for 2014/15. Members suggested that West Sussex County Council be asked about any work it was undertaking to tackle repeat and vulnerable victimisation. Members also suggested that the Police and Crime Commissioner could be asked to comment on this.

#### Safer Roads (lead partner: West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service)

A progress report had not been provided in the action plan template and the Working Group could not see the progress of actions undertaken in 2013/14 and whether they should be coded red, amber or green.

The Working Group noted the series of activities undertaken by CSP partners in 2013/14 to promote road safety, such as New Driver and New Rider Awareness programmes, National Bike Week, and summer and Christmas drink drive campaigns.

The CSP had, in 2013, reacted to a spate of road casualties and deaths in Horsham District by increasing its community engagement with District Youth, providing Safe Drive sessions and by starting additional work with Billingshurst Parish Council because that area had been directly impacted by a number of road traffic casualties.

Members noted that nine people had been killed and 84 seriously injured in road traffic collisions (KSI) in Horsham District in 2013/14. The figures for West Sussex showed an increase in KSI from 420 in 2012 to 438 in 2013. In particular there had been increases in KSIs for pedestrians and cyclists in West Sussex.

The Working Group agreed to invite the lead officer from West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service to attend its next meeting to discuss this action plan.

#### <u>Reducing violence against the person including domestic abuse</u> (lead partner: Sussex Police)

The action plan update stated that there had been 261 violence against the person offences recorded for 2013/14 which represented a 9.3% increase when compared to 2012/13.

ABH offences (assaults where injury was caused) totalled 311 which was an increase of 11.1% or 33 offences when compared to 2012/13.

Domestic abuse incidents had increased by 12.9% (70 incidents) as at 5th February 2014. That increase had continued with domestic abuse crime increasing by 61 offences as at 15<sup>th</sup> September 2014.

The increase in recorded violent crime had continued for 2014/15 to date, with significant increases from June to August 2014 inclusive. Members wished to know the reason for these increases given that many of the action points for 2013/14 were coded green as having been achieved.

The Working Group agreed to request Chief Inspector Hodges to provide detailed crime data for Horsham District and explanations of any significant trends.

#### Other matters arising from the CSP Action Plans

Members briefly discussed the work of Police Support Community Officers (PCSOs) and queried whether PCSO workloads may be increasing but without any additional powers, and how the reorganisation of PCSO areas had affected their role and efficiency.

Members suggested that warnings could be issued to the public about specific current crimes and scams, perhaps with a feature appearing in the Horsham District News magazine.

The Working Group agreed to request the Scrutiny and Overview Committee to recommend that the Council invite the Sussex Police and Crime Commissioner to attend a meeting with Councillors to answer questions about policing, PCSOs, the increase in recorded hate crime, the need to reduce the level of risk to repeat and vulnerable victims, and any other relevant issues.

The Chairman of the Scrutiny and Overview Committee suggested that the Community Safety Manager could be invited to attend that Committee to discuss the CSP's engagement with the scrutiny process.

Members had not yet received the final action plan for 2014/15 which was being developed to tackle issues around drugs and alcohol.

Members requested that all action plan updates include a headline summary at the start and also explain the reasons for any significant increases and/or decreases in crime.

The Chairman agreed that she would, at the CSP Board meeting on 29<sup>th</sup> October 2014, request the CSP Plan for 2014/15, the action plan for tackling issues around drugs and alcohol, and highlight the out of date information posted on the CSP website. That Board meeting would discuss the half yearly position of the action plans for 2014/15.

#### 6. CRIME STATISTICS FOR HORSHAM DISTRICT

The Working Group noted the monthly crime statistics for Horsham District for each category of crime since 2011, along with the associated pie chart and graphs for each classification of crime from August 2013 to August 2014.

The data had informed their discussions of the performance in relation to each of the available CSP action plans for 2013/14.

#### 7. FUTURE MEETING DATE

The Working Group agreed to meet in December 2014 and to invite the following CSP partners to attend to discuss performance in delivering their CSP action plans for 2013/14 and any other relevant issues:

Reducing Anti-Social Behaviour - the Community Safety Manager;

Community engagement and reassurance – the Community Safety Officer;

Reducing the level of risk to repeat and vulnerable victims – a representative from West Sussex County Council to explain how this work would be progressed in light of it not being a CSP action plan for 2014/15;

Safer Roads – the Deputy District Commander (Central Group), West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service;

Violence against the person – Chief Inspector Hodges or a representative from Sussex Police; and

Data analysis – a representative from West Sussex County Council to explain the reasons why detailed data analysis was no longer provided.

The Working Group, at its December meeting, would also discuss the CSP Plan for 2014/15 and the half year performance statistics.

The meeting finished at 4.55 p.m. having commenced at 3.30 p.m.

### PROTOCOL FOR THE SCRUTINY OF CRIME AND DISORDER MATTERS Horsham District Council

### 1. Introduction

The power to scrutinise local Community Safety Partnerships (CSP) is granted through a number of pieces of legislation including: The Police and Justice Act 2006, the Local Government & Public Involvement in Health Act 2007. Most recently however the Crime and Disorder Overview and Scrutiny Regulations 2009 (and statutory guidance) has granted local authorities new powers for the scrutiny of crime and disorder and Councillor Call for Action (CCfA).

The legislation has widened the provisions of Overview and Scrutiny and defines those crime and disorder functions or matters that may be considered by Overview and Scrutiny Committees and those that are considered 'excluded matters'.

These require that every local authority has in place a committee with power to review and scrutinise, and make reports or recommendations, regarding the functioning of the responsible authorities (*which include*): Horsham District Council, West Sussex County Council, West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service, Sussex Police, the Primary Care Trust and Surrey and Sussex Probation Service) that comprise a Community Safety Partnership (CSP). The new legislation forms part of the Government's commitment to strengthen the accountability of local CSP's and enhance the role of local councillors and local communities in preventing and reducing crime. In Horsham District, the Scrutiny and Overview Committee has been designated the "Crime and Disorder Committee" for the purposes of scrutinising crime and disorder matters.

#### 2. Purpose of the Protocol

The purpose of this protocol is to define the manner in which the Scrutiny and Overview Committee can scrutinise the Horsham District CSP and its partners with a view to facilitating good working relationships throughout the scrutiny process.

#### 3. <u>Principles of the Community Safety Scrutiny Operation</u>

(i) Community Safety Scrutiny is intended to be positive, objective and constructive. It should acknowledge good practice and recommend improvements where it feels these would be of benefit. The Scrutiny process should focus on service outcomes and seek to add value and drive improvements to public services.

- (ii) Community Safety and reducing crime and disorder for the people of Horsham District is dependant on many factors including the services provided through the Community Safety Partnership. This shared responsibility will be acknowledged by the Overview and Scrutiny Committee when undertaking scrutiny reviews.
- (iii) At all times, both Officers and Members of the organisations involved in crime and disorder scrutiny, representatives and Members of the public will be treated with respect and courtesy.
- (iv) The key organisations involved in the scrutinising of crime and disorder must be willing to share information, knowledge and reports which relate to the delivery and success of services in Horsham District, and carry out duties that would be reasonably expected of them to enable crime and disorder scrutiny to be successfully undertaken.
- (v) Crime and disorder scrutiny will be open and transparent.

#### 4. The key provisions of the legislation

These are as follows:

- Every local authority is required to have in place a Crime and Disorder Committee with power to review and scrutinise, and make reports and recommendations, regarding the discharge by the responsible authorities of their crime and disorder functions;
- (2) Crime and Disorder Committees must meet at least once a year;
- (3) Responsible authorities or co-operating bodies (non statutory CSP members) must provide such information requested by the Crime and Disorder Committee within the timescales identified in the request;
- (4) Crime and Disorder Committees can request the attendance of a representative of a responsible authority or co-operating body in order to answer questions;
- (5) Responsible authorities or co-operating bodies must respond to any recommendations made by the Crime and Disorder Committee within 28 days.
- (6) Crime and Disorder Committees can co-opt additional members to serve on the committee to add value and expertise to the Committee's work. Cooptees can include any person except a member of the local authority's executive.

#### 5. <u>Terms of Reference for the scrutiny and overview of crime and</u> <u>disorder in Horsham District</u>

The function and terms of reference of the Scrutiny and Overview Committee in relation to Crime and Disorder issues are as follows:

- (1) to scrutinise the work of the CSP and the partners who comprise it, insofar as their activities relate to the partnership itself;
- (2) to make reports and / or recommendations to the Council with respect to the discharge by the CSP of its crime and disorder functions;
- (3) to act as a 'critical friend' of the CSP, providing it with constructive challenge at a strategic level rather than adversarial fault-finding at an operational level;
- (4) to consider Councillor Call for Actions (CCfAs) that arise through the Council's CCfA process and which relate to Crime and Disorder matters.

**Work Programming** - The CSP will be advised in advance of any scrutiny review relating to a crime and disorder issue that the Scrutiny and Overview Committee is intending to undertake as part of its annual work programme.

**Scrutiny Topics** - These may include scrutiny of the CSP partnership plan, the strategic assessment, performance reports, or any activities relating to crime and disorder matters which are co-ordinated at district level. It is recommended that performance against the partnership plan be considered as the benchmark for any selected topic.

**Notice of required attendance at scrutiny meetings** -The Scrutiny and Overview Committee will give <u>at least 4 weeks notice</u> to responsible/cooperating authorities requesting their attendance at a scrutiny and overview meeting. Attendance requests will clearly outline the scope of the scrutiny exercise.

**Notice of Information required for scrutiny** -The Scrutiny and Overview Committee will give <u>at least 4 weeks notice</u> to responsible / co-operating authorities requesting information relating to the planning and operation of crime and disorder reduction activities and strategies that it requires in order to facilitate the overview and scrutiny process. Information provided by responsible/co-operating authorities should be depersonalised, unless the identification of an individual is necessary or appropriate for the Overview and Scrutiny Committee to properly exercise its powers. The information should also not include information that would be reasonably likely to prejudice legal proceedings or current or future operations of the responsible authority/co-operating authorities.

**Making and Responding to Recommendations** - At the conclusion of its study, the Scrutiny and Overview Committee will consult the CSP on any draft reports and associated recommendations before they are published. Final reports and recommendations will be sent to the relevant responsible / co-operating authorities that are affected by the report or recommendations, plus other individuals or organisations that contributed to the study. As required by the legislation, responsible / co-operating authorities must respond to any relevant recommendations made by the Scrutiny and Overview Committee within 28 days of receipt.

**Monitoring the Implementation of Recommendations** - The Scrutiny and Overview Committee will monitor, as appropriate, progress in implementing any recommendations.

**Reviewing the Protocol -** This protocol will be kept under regular review to ensure it remains fit for purpose and compliant with emerging legislation.

# Extract from Sussex Police and Crime Commissioner / Sussex Police Performance Report, August/September 2014

### **Performance Reports**

Each week the Commissioner has a formal meeting with the Chief Constable which allows them to discuss a variety of issues, many of which are raised by members of the community.

Once a month the meeting focuses on the Police's performance set against the four key areas in the Police and Crime Plan. This is the Commissioner's opportunity to hold the Chief Constable to account by having a detailed look at what Sussex Police is doing to reduce crime, improve the confidence of victims and witnesses and the general public as well as getting best value for money.

# Crime and Community Safety

### Reduce the risk of crime per 1,000 population

There was an increase of 5.7% in total crime for the first six months of the Policing Plan Year, equating to an increase of 2441 crimes. Violence against the person increased by 3705 crimes, a rise of 41.5% compared to same period last year. Other increases in crime include sexual offences which increased by 246 (+26.7%) and drug offences, which are up by an additional 133 crimes (+6.5%).

When comparing this plan year with last, recorded crime changes across divisions show different pictures. The greatest increase was in East Sussex (+14.1%), followed by West Sussex at +2.6% and a slight decrease in Brighton and Hove of -0.5%.

Violence against the person accounted for the greatest volume of crime during this period showing increases across all of the divisions. The risk of violence with injury in Sussex, however, remains low, where Sussex is the 15<sup>th</sup> safest force nationally with just 4.9 offences of violence with injury per 1,000 residents in Sussex this year.

Sexual offences increased by 246 offences, which equates to an increase of +26.7%. All divisions saw increases during the first six months of the current plan year, namely: Brighton and Hove with 61 more offences (+31.4%), East Sussex with 73 more (+25.6%) and West Sussex with 95 more (+24.2%)

A large burglary dwelling reduction of 58 crimes in Brighton and Hove has led to an overall increase of just 36 offences in Sussex (+2.3%). However, both East Sussex and West Sussex show increases of 56 additional crimes (+14.4%) and 37 additional crimes (+5.1%) respectively.

The risk of burglary of people's homes across Sussex is 4.6 offences per 1000 households, which is the 11<sup>th</sup> lowest across all 43 forces and remains the force with the least risk in our MSG (Most Similar Group [of police forces]) with the exception of Hampshire.

Vehicle crime in Sussex reduced by 607 offences (-16.4%). All three divisions showed reductions, the greatest of which was in Brighton and Hove where there was a 23.2% decrease (228 crimes).

# **Public Confidence**

# Increase the reporting of domestic violence and abuse, serious sexual offences, anti-social behaviour and hate crimes

#### Serious sexual offences

There was an increase of 23%, (170 more offences recorded) for serious sexual offences.

Brighton and Hove recorded a 32.3% increase (53 more offences), East Sussex a 30% increase (67 more crimes) and West Sussex an increase of 10.8% (34 more offences).

#### **Domestic abuse**

Recorded domestic abuse crimes showed an increase in reporting of 38.5% for the plan year with 1281 more offences.

All three divisions showed increases. East Sussex showed an increase of 64.8% (621 offences), Brighton and Hove +56.8% (315 offences) and West Sussex +17.7% (also 315 offences).

#### Anti-social behaviour

ASB crimes are showing an increase for the performance plan year to date of 5.6%, reflecting an increase of 10.6% for Brighton & Hove, +10.9% for East Sussex, and a small decrease of 0.6% in West Sussex.

#### **Hate Crime**

The Force has seen an increase of 12.5% over the same period last year. Brighton and Hove shows an increase of 45.7% compared to last year and East Sussex a 14.3% increase. West Sussex has recorded a reduction of 8.3%.




Crime Breakdown - Nov 2013-Oct 2014

Crime Type And ASB Charts For Horsham District Council










Apologies for not responding sooner. This is a very difficult question to answer. I actually took over the Horsham Road Safety Accident Group in early 2014 from Roy Barraclough - another Station Manager from Central Group. Until August 2013 the RSAG had been absorbed into the North Area RSAG which comprised of Horsham, Mid-Sussex and Crawley. Following a spate of KSI in Horsham District, the CSP met and discussed what should be done about the deaths and what work was ongoing. It was decided to revive the Horsham RSAG.

2013/2014 - Generic work went on under both the NARSAG and latterly the Horsham RSAG:

- Junior Citizen
- Summer and xmas drink drive campaigns
- Support for Tyre Safe
- Schools education from WSCC, Fire and Police
- Bikeability, cycle training
- Community Speedwatch

- Junior Road Safety Officer
- Safe Drive, Stay Alive
- New Driver and New Rider Awareness programs
- Southwater Safer Roads
- Mocktails
- National Bike Week.

Additionally following on from the deaths we stepped up community engagement with the District Youth by sending CSP resources to the Snack Wagon, NDA provided at Horsham Fire Station, reviewed our provision of Safe Drive sessions and started additional work with Billingshurst Parish Council as they were directly impacted by a number of RTCs.

Most of these activities were jointly resourced with partners having greater or lesser involvement depending on the activity.

#### Horsham roads second most lethal in county

#### West Sussex County Times

# Nine people were killed and 84 suffered serious injuries in road traffic collisions in the Horsham district between April 2013 and March 2014.

Road safety figures produced by West Sussex County Council reveal that only roads in the Mid Sussex district are more dangerous than Horsham within the county.

A total of 109 people were killed or seriously injured on Mid Sussex roads during the period of time - compared to 93 in Horsham.

The Mid Sussex district is also larger in size than the Horsham district.

The figure drops to 52 in the Worthing district and 34 in the Crawley district.

Inspector Phil Nicholas of Sussex Police's road policing unit said: "While it seems a worrying upward trend in seriously injured casualties in the Horsham district, this should also be seen in light of the previous years, which shows we have had a high reduction in casualties.

"One fatality on our roads is one too many.

"Making further reductions in casualty rates year on year, on the back of significant past reductions becomes increasingly difficult but this is something that we are committed to."

A further 342 people received slight injuries in road accidents to take place in Horsham.

In West Sussex there were 30 fatalities on roads within the period of time, while 450 people received serious injuries and 2195 slight injuries.

Insp Nicholas added: "Sussex Police continues to work with the council and our partners that make up the Safer Roads Partnership to develop a strategy which looks at reducing and preventing road casualties.

"In addition to undertaking enforcement and education initiatives, we need to work with local communities to ensure there are greater levels of respect by all road users, as we endeavour to make our roads safer."

#### A new Alcohol Wellbeing Advisor appointed for the Horsham district

Dan Barritt has recently been appointed as the new Alcohol Wellbeing advisor for the Horsham District.

The role has been commissioned by Public Health West Sussex to provide one-to-one support for adults who are drinking at increasing levels.

The support will be provided through Extended Brief Interventions (EBI's), aiming to target "Increasing risk drinkers" and "Higher risk drinkers".

Specifically, Dan will be providing:

- Free and confidential 2-12 one-to-one motivational interviewing sessions
- Ongoing support of up to 12 weeks
- Alcohol specific (and wider) health Information, resources and advice
- Referral to other wellbeing (and other support) services as required
- Follow up calls from the Wellbeing Service at 2 weeks, then at 3 and 6 months after the end of sessions
- Advocacy and referrals to specialist alcohol services
